



Wood Briquettes for Wood Burning Stoves

Wood Briquettes for wood burning stoves, open fires and for summer chimineas and fire pits.

Compared to logs wood briquettes burn hotter for longer (making them more economical) they are much cleaner to handle and produce less spitting when lit. They also create less ash and produce lower tar residues, making cleaning up much easier!

Light and use in the same way as coal or logs or follow our Using Wood briquettes guide to light without kindling and paper!

Can be supplied in packs of 12 or 24 briquettes or by the tonne or 1/2 tonne.

Wood briquettes are made from clean wood waste that is collected from different sources.

A lot of this wood would otherwise have gone to landfill - take the case of the broken pallets we collect, when they are not viable for repair anymore we use them in our Wood briquettes.

This means that the wood that started life working as a pallet, then goes on to have a useful secondary life when it cannot be usefully repaired - providing heat as a Hotblock.

And finally the ash from its burning can happily be put on your garden giving it a third and final life!

How to use Wood Briquettes

Wood briquettes are intended for use on open fires, wood burning stoves, wood burning/log boilers, chimeneas and fire pits.

We recommended lighting a Wood briquettes fire in the following way as this does not require the use of any kindling or paper to get the fire started:-

Place two Wood briquettes on their sides about 1? apart with a third block over the top forming a bridge.

Place a couple of firelighters in the gap, and light.

If you are using a wood burning stove, open up the draw and baffle to get the fire burning initially. When the appliance reaches a suitable temperature, damp down to leave your preferred flame pattern.

Resist the temptation to poke a Wood briquettes fire as this will break up the blocks and increase air flow into the centre of the fire, this will substantially reduce the burn time.

When required place another one or two Wood briquettes onto the fire.

A note of caution* Take care not to overload the fire with Wood briquettes as they burn very hot. Care should also be taken for some hours after the fire has died down as the ash may remain hot for up to 12 hours. It is usually possible to re-ignite the fire by placing 2 new Hotblocks into the hot ash and opening the draw until the fire is actively burning once again.
